Global Entrepreneurship Week 2023

For a full week in November, Hull became a hotbed of activity linked to Global Entrepreneurship Week 2023.

The week kicked off with a launch event of Make £5 Blossom, where 13 schools were linked up

with 13 businesses, each business provided their school partner with a loan of £150 and challenged the young people to go away and make a profit. The businesses will act as mentors for the school they are linked with, and support them with their venture



where they can. Hopefully they all return at the end celebration event in April 2024, share their enterprising journey, and reflect on how important the Big 13 enterprise skills were along the way.

Other activities in the week included a Zoom link up with Australia and South Africa where young entrepreneurs from across the world were able to discuss the challenges they face as business owners. There was also the judging of the Adam Corbally Enterprise Video Pitch Challenge, with two age groups of under

16s and 16 to 24 bidding for some funding and mentorship, by sending a 2-minute video pitch about their idea.



The Thursday and Friday of the week saw full day activities in place for Secondary and Primary schools respectively, where they were set an enterprising challenge to create an event for one of the local sports stadiums in Hull. The top six tables on each day were shortlisted to pitch their ideas to the judges and all won high street vouchers.



Wrapping up the week was the Friday evening Awards Event where several young people, mentors, teachers, and businesses were recognised for the impact they have had over the past year and beyond. All in all in was a fantastic week of events and celebrated 20 years of Enterprise and Global Entrepreneurship Week in Hull.





The Hull Story meets Dylan & Markus

On 20th December, Markus Tipler and Dylan Whiting were invited to talk to Phil Ascough of The Hull Story about what brought them to MC4C, how MC4C helped them in starting up a business, and their recently appointed ambassador roles.

We chatted about their businesses and although very different, they both had similar stories to tell about homelessness, living in hostels and eventually finding their feet and pursuing their passion of working for themselves.

Markus and Dylan both received test market grants from the John Cracknell Youth Enterprise Bank in December and have began buying their stock and equipment needed to make a start on



making their dreams a reality. Markus is the founder of "Rootz Ov Us" a sustainable eco-friendly, vegan clothing store that promotes connecting back to our roots in nature. He told his story about how his business idea evolved as he grew and how his life experiences have shaped the business he currently has. Dylan is the founder of "LLM Services" offering PAT testing around the city to companies, community centres and homes alike. After Dylan's experiences in hostels, he wants to give back to the community by offering these services and diversifying his business model in the future to have a bigger positive impact.

Dylan and Markus, alongside 2 other ambassadors, and our Youth Enterprise Champions, Becca and Alex, will be helping connect our communities to enterprise and they are wonderful role models who prove anything is possible with a bit of help and determination.

Charles Cracknell Secretary of John Cracknell Youth Enterprise Bank said:



The children were one of the six teams shortlisted, and they then had to pitch their idea to the whole room of people and the judges.

Last year, Thorpepark came in 2nd place, but this year we won! The children won £250 worth of vouchers, and they, as the school council, will decide how to spend the winnings.

The Lord Mayor of Hull opened the Primary school event, and offered to host a morning breakfast for the eventual winners. So as well as winning the first prize of high street vouchers, the children will also be visiting the Lord Mayors Parlor at the Guildhall in January.
